Proposed Water Shortage Rates

Board must approve surcharges prior to implementation

Proposed Water Shortage Rates	Rates	
Stage 3	% Target Reduction	Surcharge * \$/100 cf
Advisory Stage 1	<10%	\$ 0.15
Alert Stage 2	11% - 15%	0.20
Moderate Stage 3	16% - 25%	0.35
Critical Stage 4	26% - 49%	0.80
Emergency Stage 5	>50%	1.29

^{*} Surcharge is charged for all consumption regardless of tier.



Proposed Agricultural Rates

- Current rate
- \$9.70 per acre foot
- Proposed rate
- January 1, 2019: \$12.00 per acre foot
- January 1, 2020: \$15.00 per acre foot
- January 1, 2021: \$18.00 per acre foot
- January 1, 2022: \$18.00 per acre foot
- January 1, 2023: \$18.00 per acre foot

Proposed Sewer Rates

^{*} Non-Residential Rates are Per Equivalent Residential Unit



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- March 28 Board recommends proposed rates and initiates Prop 218 process
- April / May public outreach
- May 23 public hearing / adoption of new rates if no majority protest and Board adoption
- rates take effect July 15, 2018 - new water, sewer, water shortage
- January 1, 2019 new agricultural rates take effect

Proposition 218

- All impacted property owners receive written notice of a Public Hearing. proposed rate changes a minimum of 45 days prior to
- Prop 218 does not provide a process to vote for or against rate increases, it provides a "protest" process
- Protests must be submitted in writing, even if property owners plan to attend the Public Hearing
- protests, proposed rate changes will not be imposed If a majority (50% +1) of affected property owners file
- District verifies and counts all protests
- Rate Hearing must be publicly noticed

Proposition 218 protest letter

- attending the Public Hearing, and include: Protests must be submitted in writing, even if
- Description of property (APN or street address)
- A statement that the letter constitutes a protest to the proposed rate changes, and indicate which proposed rate change is being protested (water and/or sewer).
- The protest must be signed and dated by the property owner on record
- Only one protest for each property will be counted.
- Must be received, not postmarked, by the close of the Public Hearing on May 23, 2018.
